FOREWORD

On behalf of the Management Team of the CBC Health Services, I am pleased to present our 2024 Annual Report.

2024 has been another exciting and productive year marked by transitions, challenges, and significant achievements. Our staff remained committed to the mission statement, while our partners, stakeholders and clients continue to trust and collaborate with us in promoting and advancing our Mission.

Despite hurdles such as the socio-political crisis affecting some of our facilities, economic hardship, and increasing demand for specialized healthcare, our services have thrived. Across our Health Facilities, Programs, and Training Institutions, millions of lives have been impacted. We are very much encouraged by the increasing support from partners and stakeholders. The fruits of your continued partnership have been the development of new projects and the expansion of several specialized services.

It is important to recognize that while service uptake saw a slight increase of 3.9% with Outpatient Service uptake, we continue to struggle with meeting our financial commitments. The impacts of the ongoing Socio-political crisis in the English-speak-ing Regions, home to over 40% of our facilities, coupled with the national economic downturn, has deeply affected our financial sustainability and worsening our financial situation. sincerely commend you, our staff, for your understanding, resilience, and loyalty to this Mission, upholding it under very difficult conditions. Equally, we cannot underestimate the financial, material and technical support provided by our partners within this period.

It is important for me to highlight some significant partnerships we had in 2024 with focus on infrastructural development, to improve access specialized services at differ-ent levels. There is the partnership with the African Children's Hospital Fund (ACF) led by Dr. Daniel Gwan Nulla, for the construction of a State-of-the-Art Children's Hospital with construction works to commence in 2025. The Oncology Center of Excellence Project in Mbingo Baptist Hospital is ongoing, and specialists are being trained to ensure a facility that meets National and Sub-regional Oncology needs. The Rehabilitation Training Center of Excellence in Ombe funded by the AFAS Founda-tion and the Liliane Foundation has equally been completed. Thanks to the mobiliza-tion and support from local communities, we are improving on the state of the infra-structure for Ndu Baptist Hospital, Finkwi Baptist Health Center and Voundou Baptist Health Center.

In 2025 we will focus on enhancing our healthcare services and ensuring financial sustainability. We aim to improve service uptake through targeted outreach and com-munity engagement, strengthen our specialized services, optimize our workforce with appropriate staffing and capacity building, and enhance our Central Pharmacy's capac-ity to ensure a consistent supply of pharmaceuticals. Additionally, we plan to improve our infrastructure through periodic evaluations and maintenance, address debts with repayment strategies, and strengthen partnerships to raise funds for development proj-ects.

Together, these efforts will help us continue to provide quality healthcare and support our Mission to promote health and improve lives.

The Cameroon Baptist Convention Health Services (CBCHS) is a Non-profit, Faith-based, Humanitarian and Inclusive Organization with over 80 years of existence, offering holistic care to Cameroon. The CBC Health Services began operations in Cameroon in 1936 through the activities of the North American Baptist Conference (NABC) and grew steadily to an indigenous health organization in 1975.

The CBCHS provides both facility and community-based services within a network of over 96 health facilities with 15 Hospitals, 27 Integrated Health Centers and 54 Primary Health Centers in both Urban and Rural settings spread across seven of Cameroon's ten Regions. The CBCHS runs a portfolio of 13 Public Health, Community Development and Social Programs, complementing our facility-based care package, together with the Training Schools for Health Personnel, Residency Programs in General Surgery and Internal Medicine and a Pharmaceutical Production, Procurement and Distribution unit.





















Facility Based Performance




5 Years Trend of Service Uptake






Current Out Patient Department (OPD) Block under construction funded by UNDP


Financial Performance

hardship and a reduction in out-of-pocket expenditure for health. In the mist of this, the departments continue to struggle to meet up with her financial commitments including acquisition of drugs and consumables, taxes and salaries.

In line with our mission statement of providing quality care to all, over 5% of our annual income covers unpaid bills and subsidizes healthcare for poor and vulnerable patients.

Challenges

1. The Socio-political Crisis in Cameroon

The ongoing crisis has led to significant instability in the Northwest and Southwest Regions. This conflict has resulted in widespread violence, displacement of populations, and disruption of essential services. Maintaining service delivery and ensuring the safety of our staff and patients is becoming very challenging. This has directly increased the cost of operations of operations while reducing our income as most patients in these regions cannot afford the cost of health care with many of our clients not being able to pay their bills.

2. General Economic Hardship

The widespread economic hardship significantly impacted the ability of the population to afford healthcare services. Rising inflation, stagnating wages, and overall financial instability forced many households to prioritize basic survival needs over medical care, leading to delayed treatments and worsening health conditions. The strain on family incomes made it increasingly difficult for patients to cover hospital bills, purchase medications, or access specialized services.

3. Limited Human Resources

The CBCHS continues to face challenges in recruiting highly specialized medical professionals essential for many facilities. While the demand for specialists remains high, securing qualified person-

nel has been difficult due to their expectations of substantial pay packages.

4. Infrastructural Limitations


Several of our facilities lacked adequate workspace and equipment to accommodate expanding services, including new programs. Some of our facilities operated in rented structures adapted to provide care, which makes service delivery challenging. The need for improved infrastructure is evident across many of our facilities but we are currently limited by finances.

5. Drug Availability Issues

We continue to struggle with shortages of pharmaceutical products and supplies. Drug shortages severely impact patient care, especially for the poor, who often cannot afford alternatives.

6. Healthcare Accessibility

Providing healthcare services to remote and underserved communities remains one of the most pressing challenges for the CBCHS. Many of these areas suffer from poor infrastructure, limited transportation, and geographical barriers that cut off populations from essential medical care. Reaching these communities often requires navigating difficult terrain, enduring harsh conditions, and mobilizing specialized outreach efforts.



The Oncology Center of Excellence

The Children's Hospital Project

The CBC Health Services (CBCHS) is set to embark on an ambitious project with the establishment of a state-of-the-art pediatric hospital, a first-of-its-kind facility in Cameroon and the Central Africa Sub-region. This initiative is spearheaded by the African Children's Healthcare Fund, a US-based organization, led by Cameroonian-born Cardiothoracic Surgeon, Dr. Daniel Gwan-Nulla.

Dr. Gwan-Nulla, along with a team of experts, visited Cameroon in February and November 2024 to evaluate he to evaluate potential sites for the hospital within the CBCHS. Their mission is driven by the alarming rates of infant mortality in Sub-Saharan Africa, with the vision to provide children in Cameroon and across Africa with healthcare services comparable to those in developed countries.

The proposed pediatric hospital will be a one-stop-shop for comprehensive child healthcare services, eliminating the need for referrals to other facilities. This project will enhance the quality of care, operational efficiency, access to technology and medication, innovation, and sustainability within the CBCHS.



The CBC Health Services has been chosen due to its exemplary record of providing quality healthcare in Cameroon. The hospital will serve as a beacon of hope, ensuring that children receive the specialized care they need to survive and thrive.

With support from international partners, including architectural and engineering experts, the CBCHS is

poised to make a significant impact on child health-care. The commitment and dedication of Dr. Gwan-Nulla and his team reflect their resolve to change the narrative of healthcare in Africa.



Impact Stories

Rowan's Journey with Disability and Liliane Foundation's Support

Born on December 12, 2000, in Yaounde, Cameroon, I faced significant challenges due to rheumatoid arthritis, which made me unable to sit, stand, or walk for long periods. Thanks to support from the Liliane Foundation through the EDID Program, I underwent surgeries to release contractures in my knees and hands, received physical therapy, and was provided with financial assistance for my education.

Unveiling the Truth: Baby Abigail's Journey to Health and Hope

Baby Abigail, 8 months old, was brought to Rev. Kembung Joseph for prayers as her family believed she was bewitched. Drawing on his experience with the humanitarian response team, Rev. Joseph recog-nized that Abigail was malnourished. He counseled the family and coordinated with the CBCHS CERF team to get Abigail to the hospital despite initial resis-tance. Once treated, Abigail's health improved significantly within two weeks, thanks to proper nutrition and Rev. Joseph's dedicated support.

From Misunderstanding to Miracles: Useni's Journey to Health

Useni, a twin from a traditional community, was believed to possess "powers" affecting growth. When he couldn't walk or creep at age two, his step-mother and father sought help. During a door-to-door screening in Nforya, a Community Health Worker diagnosed Useni with severe acute malnutrition using a MUAC tape. After much counseling, the parents agreed to treatment despite initial skepticism. Within two weeks, Useni showed significant improvement, and in six weeks, his weight increased from 8kg to 9.9kg. He could stand, walk, and play. His father's misconception was replaced with gratitude, and he advocates for other children, promising to refer to similar cases in his community.



Nathan's Disability and Liliane Foundation's Intervention

Nathan Ngoumsop, overcame severe vision impair-ment due to developmental cataracts with the support of the Liliane Foundation and Etoug-Ebe Baptist Hospital. His surgery, partially funded by the Foundation, restored his vision.

Today he enjoys playing with his siblings and friends, watching TV, and attending birthday parties, showing his integration into the communi-ty. story highlights His timely transformative impact of medical intervention, community aware-ness, family resilience, offering hope for a brighter future for children with disabilities.



Anelson's Disability and Liliane Foundation's Intervention

Born on April 21, 2014, in Bafoussam, Cameroon, Anelson was diagnosed with cerebral palsy, hindering his ability to walk. The Liliane Foundation, through the CBCHS CBR (SEEPD) program, provided essential support, including counseling, mobility aids, and school fees, transforming his life. This intervention highlights the power of timely support and community awareness in improving the lives of children with disabilities, paving the way for a brighter future for Anelson.





Best Practices in Clubfoot Care in Cameroon: The Inspirational Journey of Chia Samuel

Chia Samuel, a 5-year-old from Kumba, Cameroon, is a shining example of successful clubfoot treatment. Born to a single mother and raised by his determined grandmother, Samuel faced challenges in accessing consistent treatment. After initial setbacks, he underwent successful surgery at Baptist Hospital Mutengene in October 2024, supported by Hope and Heal-

ing International. Today, Samuel eagerly anticipates starting school, and his grandmother expresses heartfelt gratitude to the organizations that transformed his life, underscoring the importance of dedicated care and support in achieving positive outcomes for Clubfoot treatment in Cameroon.

Public-Private Partnership for Improving Access to Inclusive Health Care

Nkwen District Hospital in Bamenda, Cameroon over the years, faced significant challenges in providing accessible health care, especially for people with disabilities. Leaning from the CBC Health Services inclusive health care model and with support from CBM, the hospital has successfully piloted inclusive health care service delivery. The hospital, in cooperation with the Bamenda III Council, also implemented a 50% bill exoneration for disabled patients.

Top Stories of the Year

CBC's Partnership with the U.S. Government

H.E. Christopher John Lamora, the U.S. Ambassador to Cameroon, emphasized the successful collaboration between the Cameroon Baptist Convention (CBC) Health Services and the U.S. Government during his visit to Nkwen Baptist Hospital in Bamenda on January 24, 2024. He praised the CBC for their grassroots approach to healthcare, especially in HIV treatment and prevention, and noted that the CBC chose to work with the U.S. Government.

Pioneering Pediatric Hospital to Transform Child Healthcare in Cameroon

In 2024, Dr. Dan Gwan-Nulla, a U.S.-based Cameroonian cardiothoracic surgeon, announced plans to build a state-of-the-art pediatric hospital in Cameroon. From February 28 to March 1, 2024, he and a team of experts scouted locations in Mbingo Baptist Hospital and Baptist Hospital Mutengene. Motivated by high infant mortality rates, the hospital aims to provide comprehensive care for children without the need for referrals. "Children were not getting the kind of care they should," Dr. Gwan-Nulla emphasized. The initiative, supported by the African Children's Healthcare Fund, is set to revolutionize child healthcare in Cameroon and the Central Africa sub-region.

As follow-up to this plan, Dr. Gwan Nulla and a team of ten other experts in diverse fields of architecture, engineering, medicine and fundraising among others paid another visit to Cameroon from October 26, 2024 to November 1, 2024. This visit was concluded with a stakeholders meeting bringing key leaders of the CBC during which the vision of a state-of-the-art Children Hospital was presented and received with much appreciation from the stakeholders.

Efficient Data Management and Evidence-Based Programming, Strengthening CBC Health Services

In 2024, CBC Health Services emphasized the importance of data management through workshops, including one from February 1-2 to review 2023 reports and another from June 26-27 for PMEL zonal coordinators to harmonize their work and strategize. The Director of Health Services, Mr. Ngum Samuel, highlighted meticulous data collection and analysis

which are essential in enhancing service delivery and evidence-based programming within the CBC Health Services.

CBCHS Project Staff Conclude Enlightening Visit to Rwanda

Staff from the CBC Health Services' disability empowerment program embarked on a weeklong learning and exchange visit to Rwanda from February 19, 2024. The team visited four districts to learn about livelihood projects and inclusion strategies for people with disabilities. "We were impressed by the collective power used to overcome barriers," said SEEPD Program Manager Awa Jacques Chirac. The visit, funded by CBM, included meetings with Village Savings and Loans Associations, vocational training youths, and the Rwandan National Council of People with Disabilities (NCPD).

Goodbye to Electricity and Water Crises at Ngoun-so Baptist Hospital

The collaboration between CBC Health Services and Hope and Healing International led to the inauguration of a 57.6 kilowatt solar power plant and a 15 cubic meter water system at Ngounso Baptist Hospital on March 20. This donation addressed the hospital's acute electricity and water shortages. "This donation is a jewel for the hospital," praised Prof. Tih Pius Muffih, Director of CBCHS. The entire Ngounso community now benefits from free water access. New X-ray equipment was also dedicated alongside these systems.

Maternal and Child Health a Priority at Ndu Baptist Health Center

Ndu Baptist Health Center, supported by Drs. Odilia and Elias Bongmba and their partners, initiated the construction of a new maternity block on March 19. The goal is to eradicate maternal and child mortality. "Success in life begins at birth," emphasized Dr. Odilia Bongmba. This new block will provide essential infrastructure and equipment to improve maternal care. The project, led by Prof. Tih Pius Muffih, aims to elevate Ndu Baptist Health Center to a full-fledged hospital.



CBC Health Services Leaders Pledge Growth under New Leadership

CBC Health Services leaders dedicated themselves to growth and adaptation under the new Director of Health Services, Mr. Ngum Samuel. From May 22-24, 2024, strategic meetings were held in Yaoundé to discuss sustainability, quality improvement, human resource development, and financial strength. Mr. Ngum emphasized, "We cannot reinvent the wheel when it has been proven to work." The meetings focused on enhancing drug availability, reviewing goals and budgets, and managing staff postings and transfers.

CBM Cameroon Office Pledges Ongoing Support for **SEEPD Program**

In 2024, the Christian Blind Mission (CBM) reaffirmed its commitment to funding the SEEPD Program under the CBC Health Services. CBM's Country team conducted evaluation and monitoring visits in the Northwest Region of Cameroon, from January to March 2024. CBM Country Director Fon Juluis announced continuous funding for specific projects until 2027, including a new three-year funding for the Clubfoot Care project starting January

2024. "It was necessary to prepare the program team on how CBM is approaching the strategy 2030," Fon emphasized.

Ngum Samuel Inducted as New CBC Director of Health Services

Mr. Ngum Samuel, 48, was inducted as the new Director of Health Services (DHS) for the CBC. The ceremony took place on July 27 at Nkwen Baptist Church, overseen by CBC Executive President Rev. Dr. Nditemeh Charlemagne. Emphasizing leadership from God, Rev. Dr. Nditemeh charged Mr. Ngum to combat corruption and uphold fairness. Mr. Ngum honored his predecessor Prof. Tih Pius Muffih and outlined his roadmap focusing on resilience, innovation, research, partnerships, and patient care. "There is hope on the horizon," stated Mr. Ngum. The ceremony featured blessings from various dignitaries and highlighted Mr. Ngum's commitment to leading CBC Health Services to greater heights.

CBC Health Services and NW Conciliator Form Land-mark Partnership for Inclusion

The CBC Health Services and the Public Independent Conciliator for the Northwest signed a historic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on July 19 to promote inclusive development in the region. The partnership, hailed as a milestone by CBC Health Services Director Ngum Samuel, aims to integrate people with disabilities (PWDs) into development projects and prevent discrimination. "This MoU is a testament to our shared commitment to human rights, justice and equity," Ngum stated. The collaboration sets a new standard for inclusive governance and development practices in Cameroon, with both institutions working to safeguard and uphold the rights of PWDs.

Breaking Barriers, Saving Lives: Dr. Hygin Steve Fonkou Triumphs with Judith Chapman Award 2024 Dr. Hygin Steve Fonkou, a Transfusion Medicine specialist with CBC Health Services, won the Judith Chapman Award from the International Society of Blood Transfusion (ISBT) on June 24 in Spain. Presenting his award to Director of Health Services Mr. Ngum Samuel on July 7, Dr. Fonkou credited the CBC Health Services for their support. "This award is a testament to the unwavering support and opportunities provided by the CBC Health Services," he stated. Dr. Fonkou has significantly enhanced transfusion services since joining in 2022, marking a milestone with national training on blood transfusion in April 2024.

Strengthening Sexual and Reproductive Health Part-nerships

On July 4, 2024, Ms. Naomi Dalmonte, UNFPA Deputy Representative for Cameroon, visited CBC Health Services to discuss and reinforce partnerships in sexual and reproductive health. Welcomed by Mr. Ngum Samuel and his team, the visit included a tour of Nkwen Baptist Hospital's maternity wards. "We can meet the needs of people in hard-to-reach communities, thanks to our partnership with UNFPA," emphasized Mr. Ngum. Ms. Dalmonte announced new Canadian funding to support the Northwest and Southwest regions. The visit highlighted the successful collaboration between UNFPA and CBC Health Services.

New Director of CBC Health Services Begins Institu-tional Visits

Following his induction on July 27, Mr. Ngum Samuel, the new Director of Health Services, com-

menced his first tour of CBC Health Services institutions. From August 10-17, he visited various facilities, accompanied by Health Board Chair Prof. Judith Torimiro and Vice Chair Prof. Helen Kimbi. Emphasizing system strengthening, stewardship, resilience, and innovation, Mr. Ngum stressed, "There will be no major expansion but a focus on strengthening the existing system." The tour highlighted key projects and challenges, with the DHS urging staff to maintain high performance standards and accountability. Prof. Torimiro expressed, "Together, we shall identify areas affected by rust and apply the right oil."

CBCHS Joins CDC Cameroon Celebrates 20 Years of Public Health Impact

In 2024, the CDC celebrated 20 years of public health impact in Cameroon with a grand event on September 10 at Hilton Hotel, Yaoundé. The U.S. Ambassador to Cameroon, Christopher John Lamora, highlighted CDC's achievements in expanding HIV services, training epidemiologists, and establishing national laboratories. CDC Country Director, Dr. Mohamed Jalloh, lauded efforts in HIV, tuberculosis, and malaria interventions, and the introduction of malaria vaccines together with partners like the CBC Health Services. The CBC Health Services received recognition for its significant public health impact.

Cameroon on Course to Inclusive Development

In 2024, the Minister of Social Affairs, H.E. Mme. Babungo Community Promises to Uplift Finkwi Baptist Health Centre

In 2024, the CBC Health Services and the Babungo Community lead by Fon Ndofoa Zofoa III signed an MoU on September 27 to upgrade Finkwi Baptist Health Centre into a full-fledged hospital. The proj-



ect includes constructing a theatre, surgical ward, and Doctor's residence, expected to be completed in 2026. "This project will bring quality healthcare closer to our community," said Fon Ndofoa. The upgraded facility will serve several neighboring communities, reducing the need to travel long distances for medical care.
